## Broadleaf weed control in corn, soybeans and other crops

### Selective Broadleaf Weed Control

Basagran® herbicide is a contact herbicide that provides early postemergent control of actively growing weeds in a variety of crops. Containing the active ingredient bentazon, Basagran® herbicide controls many common broadleaf weeds and yellow nutsedge. Basagran® herbicide may be tank mixed with many popular herbicides and certain insecticides for convenient ground or aerial application options.

### Labeled Crops

Basagran® herbicide is labeled for use on the following crops:

- Beans (dry and succulent)
- Clover grown for seed
- Corn (field, sweet, seed, silage and popcorn)
- Peanuts
- Peas (dry and succulent)
- Peppermint
- Rice
- Sorghum (grain and forage)
- Soybean
- Spearmint

### Application

In general, Basagran® herbicide is applied at a rate of 1 to 2 pints per acre, depending on leaf stage and weed species. See the product label for specific rates.

### Packaging

- 2 x 2.5-gallon jugs
- Store above 32° F



### Adjuvant Use

For consistent control, adjuvants should be used with Basagran® herbicide. An oil concentrate, such as Destiny™ HC or Superb® HC adjuvant, is recommended. Ammonium sulfate (AMS) sources such as Class Act® brand adjuvants or urea ammonium nitrate (UAN) may be required to control certain weeds. To lock in spray coverage or deposition and lock out drift, include InterLock® adjuvant. When tank mixing Basagran® herbicide with other products, refer to the tank-mix partner section of the product label for recommendations.
